Words From Our Minister: Pastor Nate Eckert

Have you ever wondered what Advent is all about? What exactly does it have to do with Christmas? Advent is all about the anticipation and the preparation of those who are willing to kneel at the manger of our Savior. Advent is the 4 weeks before the Eve of Jesus' birth when we take time to prepare by examining the dark places of our lives for signs of hope. Advent is a time to prepare our hearts for Christmas. And by Christmas, I don't mean Jesus's birthday celebration, but rather that crucial step we are encouraged to take every year when we kneel at the manger and offer our heart to God.

My family has a little nickname for me around this time of year. They like to call me "Ebenezer" in reference to Mr. Scrooge from A Christmas Carol. But I don't really mind the name, I kind of like it actually. Scrooge is an ideal character to look at when it comes to seeing how our anticipation and preparation during Advent should transform us.

I love to watch the transformation of that bitter, grumpy, "bah-humbug" of Scrooge! That moment when Scrooge wakes up and realizes he still has a chance to open his heart to the Cratchit family is something very special to see. My favorite moment is when Fred Cratchit is holding Tiny Tim on his shoulders and Tiny Tim declares those ever-familiar words, "God bless us, every one." That scene really helps us see what it takes to come to the place in our hearts where we would kneel at the manger of our Savior in surrender.

Pope John Paul II in his address on Dec. 18, 2002, said, "The liturgy of Advent...helps us to understand fully the value and meaning of the mystery of Christmas. It is not just about commemorating the historical event, which occurred some 2,000 years ago in a little village of Judea. Instead, it is necessary to understand that the whole of our life must be an 'advent,' a vigilant awaiting of the final coming of Christ. To predispose our mind to welcome the Lord who, as we say in the Creed, one day will come to judge the living and the dead, we must learn to recognize him as present in the events of daily life. Therefore, Advent is, so to speak, an intense training that directs us decisively toward him who already came, who will come, and who comes continuously."

Scrooge's encounters throughout the classic story helped him to recognize his need to surrender and kneel at the manger. Each and every day, through the dark times and the good times, we can see that Jesus is present in the events of our daily lives. The season of Advent ought to be a season of transformation in us. It ought to be a time, like Scrooge, where we make ourselves aware, or better yet, God reveals to us the things in our lives that do not point people to Christ. Scrooge discovered hope through his encounters and he embraced that hope and shared it with others. Advent ought to be a time where we rediscover the hope we have because of Jesus as we "swing portals of our hearts" wide open to those we impact each day.

As Scrooge said in the Christmas classic, "I will honor Christmas in my heart, and try to keep it all the year." Let us do the same.

It all starts and ends with Jesus, the reason we celebrate the Christmas season. The humble birth of the long-awaited Messiah in a rustic stable, was announced by an angel. "I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David, a Savior who is the Messiah, the Lord." Like the lowly shepherds who were amazed by the angel's good news, we also come to worship our Lord at Christmas. This baby Jesus was to become a light and hope for the world teaching us how to love God and each other.

I am looking forward to the Christmas season with its special music, the food, the decorations and celebratory gatherings with family and friends. A Christmas wish is for time together with family to share old memories and create new ones. I have wonderful memories of childhood holidays with a large extended family of cousins, aunts, and uncles. As time passed, my siblings married and there was a new batch of babies and young children. I became the single aunt loving them all. Now I am a great-aunt with a new evolving generation to enjoy and love this Christmas season.

I wish and pray that we will all share the Advent themes of Hope, Joy, Peace, and Love as we celebrate the birth of the Christ child when God sent his son Jesus to live among us. Hallelujah! Merry Christmas!
