The Advent

Season is a very

special time of year that sometimes gets lost in the bright lights of the Christmas season that follows it. Speaking of lights, have you ever considered the candles of the Advent wreath? Is lighting them just something we do? What do they mean? Why are they there?

The candles also have their own special significance. The four colored candles represent the four weeks of Advent, and one additional candle is lit each Sunday. The flames of candles are a representation of the Christmas light – the Christ Light - approaching, bringing hope and peace in the struggle against darkness.

- On the first week of Advent this year, we will light the first purple candle to mark the first week of Advent as we wait for the birth of our Savior. This first candle, sometimes referred to as the "Angel's Candle," symbolizes peace. It reminds us of the message of the angels: "Peace on Earth, goodwill toward men."
- The second candle this year is the pink candle. This candle symbolizes joy. It is called the "Shepherd's Candle," and is pink because rose is a liturgical color for joy. The Sunday of Advent is meant to remind us of the joy that the world experienced at the birth of Jesus, as well as the joy that the faithful look forward to.
- The third candle this year, which is the color purple, symbolizes hope. It is sometimes called the "Prophecy Candle" in remembrance of the prophets, especially Isaiah, who foretold the birth of Christ. It represents the hope-filled expectation felt in anticipation of the coming Messiah.
- This year, the fourth candle, also purple, represents love. It is also called the "Bethlehem Candle" as a reminder of Mary and Joseph's journey to Bethlehem. It symbolizes love to remind us of how Jesus came into the messiness of this world to show everyone how great God's love is.
 - At the center of the wreath (which symbolizes creation) and in the center of the four other candles stands the final candle that is lit on Christmas Eve. This candle is white and called the "Christ Candle." It represents the life of Christ. The color white is for purity because Christ is our sinless, pure Savior. It is placed at the center to show that Christ is the center of all creation, as well as the center of our peace, joy, hope, and love.

Light helps us to see in dark spaces. As we prepare for Jesus' arrival, will we help others see the peace, joy, hope, and love that God's Light brings into this world? May the light of the Advent season burn bright within you and may the Light of Christ be at the center of all you are and all you do. Amen. Pastor Nate


